The four sided pole has inscriptions in English, Spanish, Russian and Japanese and is intended to convey the message "May Peace Prevail on Earth." The FY 2016 Replacement Fund includes \$100,000 for the replacement of a 1997 Case Backhoe. The backhoe being replaced is 18 years old and has extensive corrosion in the operator's station, and outdated pins and bushings cause imprecision with the equipment operation. Public Works staff has identified a Case 580 Super N Loader Backhoe available for purchase from Folcomer Equipment Corporation. As a member of NJPA, the City is able to purchase this backhoe for \$94,900.20, per Contract #032515. This backhoe utilizes a Tier 4 emissions technology that eliminates soot associated with diesel equipment and is nearly emission-free. In addition, the new backhoe would allow utilization of a stump grinder and other attachments. It is recommended Council approve the purchase of a Case 580 Super N Loader Backhoe from Folcomer Equipment Corporation at a cost of \$94,900.20 in accord with the NJPA Contract #032515. (CM)

15. Maryland's Draft Consolidated Transportation Program FY 2016-2021 - Reference:

The City has received the Draft FY 2016 – 2021 Maryland Department of Transportation Consolidated Transportation Program (CTP). The annual tour meeting is scheduled for October 22, 2015 at 2:00 p.m. at the County Administration Building in Upper Marlboro. The FY 2016 – 2021 CTP totals \$15.5 billion. In summary, \$454.8 million worth of projects have been added to the CTP with the bulk of the projects being added to the Construction Program. For Greenbelt, there are not significant program changes from the last CTP, with the exception that the full interchange at the Greenbelt Metro Station has been moved to the Construction Program. The Purple Line continues to be funded. The MD 201 Extended Project and the I-95/I-495 Capital Beltway widening feasibility study continue to be on hold. The CTP includes an estimated \$201.4 million in funding for bicycle and pedestrian improvements. The SHA program continues to include funding for the US 1 Improvement projects, and \$33.4 million has been added to the CTP for construction. Funding for Prince George's County Local Bus Program continues to be included. Consistent with the City's position last year, staff recommends City Council transmit a letter to Transportation Secretary Pete Rahn, stating the City's strong support for the transit related projects such as the Purple Line, pedestrian and bicycle projects, construction of a full interchange at Greenbelt Metro Station and US 1 improvements. Staff also

recommends City Council request that Prince George's County and SHA resurrect the MD 193 Greenbelt Road Neighborhood Improvement Project and allocate planning funds to this important project, which was put on hold in 2002. (TH)

16. Approval of PY 42 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Application - Reference:
CDBG PY 42 Application Instructions - Applications to Prince George's County for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for Program Year 42 (7/1/16-6/30/17) are due on November 6, 2015. During the last funding cycle (PY 41), the City applied for \$118,850 to reconstruct a portion of Springhill Drive. The Department of Housing & Community Development (DHCD) recommended and the County awarded \$75,000 in CDBG funding. Staff is awaiting final DHCD approval and anticipates proceeding with the project in the spring. Staff proposes to submit "Breezewood Drive Street Improvements" as the City's top priority for PY 42. This project proposes to resurface Breezewood Drive from Springhill Lane to Cherrywood Terrace including base repair, replacement of curb and gutter, installation of concrete bus pads as needed, and landscaping improvements. Staff anticipates seeking \$115,500 for this project. Staff believes the City should submit only one application for PY 42. This will allow both DHCD staff and the City's County Council representative to focus solely on this application. It is recommended Council approve submission of the PY 42 Application as outlined above. It is further recommended that Council authorize the Mayor to execute any PY 42 CDBG Operating Agreements and all other necessary documents in order to accept and implement this grant award. (DEM).

[Delegate James Tarlau has drafted legislation for introduction during the 2016 Session that would allow counties and municipal corporations to adopt and enforce local laws and regulations regarding vegetation management by electric companies, but with oversight by the Public Service Commission \(PSC\). Delegate Tarlau has asked the City for feedback on this draft legislation. Under the proposed legislation, if an electric company intends to perform vegetation management work which violates a local law or regulation they are required to try and work out an agreement with the county or municipality. If an agreement cannot be reached within 6 months, the electric company may file with the Public Service Commission \(PSC\) and they will decide the matter. During the 2013 Session, the State](#)

passed legislation (HB 587) which prohibited a County or Municipality from interfering with a utility's vegetation management program. This bill passed unanimously in the House and 35-12 in the Senate, despite the City's objections. This past Session (2015) the City supported HB 376 (Del. Tarlau) which would have repealed the provisions adopted in 2013. Delegates Healey and Washington were co-sponsors and the Maryland Municipal League supported this bill. HB 376 received an unfavorable vote (21-0) in Committee. Staff appreciates Delegate Tarlau's efforts and recommends the City support the bill. However, staff is not optimistic that this bill will pass. Electric companies will likely oppose the bill. Council direction is sought. (DEM)

Delegate James Tarlau has drafted legislation for introduction during the 2016 Session that would allow counties and municipal corporations to adopt and enforce local laws and regulations regarding vegetation management by electric companies, but with oversight by the Public Service Commission (PSC). 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This past Session (2015) the City supported HB 376 (Del. Tarlau) which would have repealed the provisions adopted in 2013. Delegates Healey and Washington were co-sponsors and the Maryland Municipal League supported this bill. HB 376 received an unfavorable vote (21-0) in Committee.

Staff appreciates Delegate Tarlau's efforts and recommends the City support the bill. However, staff is not optimistic that this bill will pass. Electric companies will likely oppose the bill.
