

REGULAR MEETING OF THE GREENBELT CITY COUNCIL held Monday, August 10, 2015.

Mayor Jordan called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m.

Committee Reports

Advisory Committee on Trees, Report #2015-1 (Recommended Trees for Use under Power Lines): Council accepted this report and recommendations which were discussed at the Pepco work session on July 22, 2015, and shared with local homeowner associations. No further action is required.

Mr. Orleans asked and was provided answers to several questions.

A Resolution to Authorize the Purchase and Installation of a Thermoplastic Polyolefin Roofing System for the Replacement of the Flat Roof at the Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center from A.K.J., Inc. at a Cost Not to Exceed \$78,200

Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Jim Sterling, Acting Director of Public Works, explained the Request for Proposals (RFP) process and the review of the six responses that were received. He said A.K.J., Inc. was the low bidder for the base bid as well as the alternative pricing for any needed replacement of the roof decking and drains.

Mayor Jordan asked at what point it would be known if roof decking and drains needed to be replaced as part of the project. Mr. Sterling said that would be known when the existing roof is removed.

Mr. Roberts asked how the project is being funded. Mr. Sterling said through the use of Program Open Space (POS) funding. Mr. Roberts said he was opposed to the use of POS funds for this type of project.

Ms. Davis said that since the Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center is a recreational amenity, this was a valuable use of POS funds. She said if POS funds were not used, it would create an extra tax burden on the residents. Mr. Roberts disagreed, stating that use of POS was not saving taxpayers any money because it is taxpayer money being used.

Ms. Pope asked if GAFC memberships will be extended for three (3) weeks to cover the period the pool is out of service. Mr. McLaughlin said yes.

Ms. Pope introduced the resolution for second reading and adoption. Mr. Putens seconded.

Greenbelt Homes, Inc. – Right-of-Way Vacation: Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Terri Hruby, Assistant Planning Director, explained that City staff has been working with Greenbelt Homes, Incorporated (GHI) staff on the vacations of certain portions of rights-of-way located at 7 court Research Road; 33 & 35 Courts Ridge Road and 9, 11 & 13 Courts Hillside Road to address yard and unit encroachment issues. She said the intent of the right-of-way vacations is to respect historic GHI yard lines as much as possible, while accommodating utility requirements and the City's desire to retain sufficient rights-of-way for public use.

After discussion, Ms. Pope moved that Council approve the stakeout plats showing the new proposed right-of-way lines, and direct to staff to work with GHI's consultant to complete the Rights-of-Way Vacation Petition Application package for distribution and final submittal to the Prince George's County Planning Board for approval. Ms. Mach seconded. The motion passed 7-0.

Belle Point Playground Path: Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

**Motion Tabled at Regular Meeting of July 13, 2015 - Ms. Davis moved that Council approve installation of a pervious path at the Belle Point playground at a cost of \$10,000. Seconded by Mr. Herling.*

Ms. Davis moved to bring this item Back to the Table. Mr. Putens seconded. The motion passed 6-1. (Roberts)

Ms. Pope said she liked the idea of a pervious concrete path but wasn't sure it was the best type of surface for this particular area which is very wet. Mr. Sterling agreed that pervious concrete would normally be preferred but in this situation he would recommend a regular concrete pathway. He noted the need to be able to access the playground for maintenance. Mr. Sterling mentioned that the playground is located in a wooded area and requires use of equipment for cleaning.

Mr. Roberts said he was opposed to spending an additional \$7,000 for the pervious concrete and said he supported the use of regular concrete for the pathway. Ms. Mach agreed, noting she didn't see the cost benefit for the use of pervious concrete in this location.

Mr. Putens asked about drainage of the water from the pathway area. Mr. Sterling said a permanent

drain will be installed under the path.

The motion failed 1-6.

Mr. Putens moved that Council approve installation of a regular concrete path at the Belle Point Playground. Ms. Pope seconded. The motion passed 6-1. (Davis)

Ms. Davis said since Greenbelt claims to be a “green” community, she will always vote for pervious surface when there is a choice between pervious and non-pervious surface.

Request of Prince George’s County Historical Society: Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Ms. Mach moved that Council approve the request from The Prince George’s County Historical Society to serve wine at its annual “Prince of a County” fundraising event to be held at the Greenbelt Theatre on Sunday, September 13. Mr. Putens seconded.

Mr. Roberts said he was opposed to approval of the request. He said the City should set an example and provide a facility where patrons can be away from alcohol. Ms. Mach said she did not think it was Council’s purview to decide what outside organizations, such as the Historical Society, should or shouldn’t do for their events.

Ms. Davis requested the Theatre Manager be reminded that patrons of the event cannot walk outside the theater with wine.

The motion passed 6-1. (Roberts)

Submission of FY 2017 Community Parks and Playground Grant Application: Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Ms. Pope moved submission of the FY 2017 Community Parks and Playground (CPP) Grant application for the renovation of the Community Center playground. Mr. Putens seconded.

Ms. Pope and Mr. Putens suggested the new equipment be colorful. Mr. Moran said the current color scheme includes blues and tans but brighter colors can be considered.

Ms. Davis asked if some benches or tables can be placed under the large tree. Mr. Moran said this can be considered. He added that the playground had been relocated from under the tree because of health concerns the play equipment posed to the tree.

There was discussion about including additional shade structures in the playground to reduce the surface temperature of the poured in place (PIP) surfacing. Mr. Moran said this can be considered, but there would be additional costs.

Mr. Roberts said he did not support the use of PIP surface in this playground because of health concerns and damage it may cause to the large tree. He said the PIP surface needs to be out of the drip zone of tree roots or the runoff will severely damage the tree.

Mayor Jordan asked what would happen if the City only received partial funding from the grant

application. Mr. Moran said it would depend on the amount of the funding received but some options would be to consider reducing the scope of the playground renovation or identifying a different source

to make up the funding difference. He added that the City had been successful in receiving total funding of CPP grant applications for the past six or seven years.

Mr. Putens suggested an engineered wood fiber (EWF) surface may be better for this playground. Mr. Moran explained that the existing playground has EWF surface. He said City staff and the Greenbelt Cooperative Nursery School staff have expressed concern about the maintenance problems with EWF surface in the playground, since the EWF constantly gets on the trike track.

Ms. Pope expressed her support for PIP surface. She said PIP provides the safest playground surface to minimize impacts of falls by children and also makes the playground more accessible for those with disabilities.

Ms. Mach said that the Park and Recreation Advisory Board had reviewed the playground surface issue and had recommended that a variety of different surface playgrounds be provided throughout the City. She said she supported the use of PIP in this playground. Ms. Mach added that the Cooperative Nursery School, one of the main users of the playground, had expressed its support for the use of PIP surfacing. She suggested that perhaps shade structures could be considered.

Susan Stewart, 2-P Plateau Place, said she supported the playground renovation but was opposed to the PIP surface which she did not feel was safe (because of burns) for children.

Mr. Roberts asked if the type of playground surface could be separated from playground renovation grant application. Mr. Moran said no, explaining that a preliminary surfacing decision was necessary because the cost needed to be included in the grant application. Ms. Davis and Mr. Herling commented that this would not preclude the City from going with a different type surface prior to the renovation. Mr. Roberts said he was only opposed to the use of PIP for the playground surfacing but was not opposed to the grant application for the playground renovation,

The motion passed 6-1. (Roberts)

Letter to State Delegation – Pepco Tree Work: Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Mayor Jordan explained that the City has advocated for more authority over Pepco's vegetation management in recent years as follows:

- 1) During the 2013 Session, the City opposed HB 587 (Del. Davis) which would prohibit a County or Municipality from interfering with a utility's vegetation management program. This bill passed unanimously in the House and 35-12 in the Senate, despite the City's objections.
- 2) In the 2015 Session, the City supported HB 376 (Del. Tarlau) which would have repealed the provisions adopted in 2013. Delegates Healey and Washington were co-sponsors. MML supported this bill. HB 376 received an unfavorable vote (21-0) in Committee.
- 3) Delegate Tarlau plans to introduce legislation in 2016 that would allow a municipality to adopt an ordinance or regulation, but require that the municipality meet with the utility to work out an agreement. If both parties fail to agree, then the PSC can determine the validity of the municipal ordinance/agreement. Staff is not optimistic that this bill will pass.

Ms. Davis suggested staff inquire from Delegates Healey and Washington why HB 376 received an unfavorable vote in Committee.

There was discussion regarding the harm Pepco's tree work/removal work is doing to communities, including loss of the tree canopy, and the need for HB 587 to be repealed.

Ms. Davis said that some homeowners feel intimidated by Pepco regarding tree work on their property. She also noted Pepco's lack of cooperation when requested to: 1) grind stumps of any trees removed on public property, and; 2) provide information on all tree removals planned (on public and private) property to the City.

After further discussion, Council requested communication (letter or emails) requesting HB 587 be repealed be sent to the State Delegation, Chairs of all Environmental Committees, the Cities of New Carrollton, College Park and Bowie; Town of Berwyn Heights; the Counties of Prince George's and Montgomery; and the Maryland Municipal League. Mayor Jordan urged Council members to personally contact the State Delegates and Senators.

Letter to County Executive Baker – School Resource Officer Funding: Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Mr. Herling moved that Council send a letter to the Prince George's County Executive urging continuation of funding for the School Resource Officer Program in the County's FY 2016 budget. Ms. Mach seconded. The motion passed 7-0.

Inquiry to Prince George's County Board of Elections: Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Ms. Davis moved that Council send a letter to the Prince George's County Board of Elections expressing concern about the lack of accuracy of the voter registration lists and requesting clarification on how the Board maintains the list according to State Law, specifically how names are purged and how often this occurs. Ms. Mach seconded. The motion passed 7-0.
