

REGULAR MEETING OF THE GREENBELT CITY COUNCIL held Monday, July 13, 2015.

Mayor Jordan called the meeting to order at 8:06 p.m.

LEGISLATION:

A Resolution to Authorize the Negotiated Purchase of Certain Goods and Services from Various Vendors as Enumerated Herein When Total Fiscal Year Purchases from Each Vendor Exceed Ten Thousand Dollars

Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Ms. Pope introduced the resolution for first reading.

A Resolution to Authorize the Purchase and Installation of a Thermoplastic Polyolefin Roofing System for the Replacement of the Flat Roof at the Greenbelt Aquatic and Fitness Center from A.K.J., Inc. at a Cost Not to Exceed \$78,200

Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Ms. Pope introduced the resolution for first reading.

BELLE POINT PLAYGROUND PATH: Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Ms. Davis moved that Council approve installation of a pervious path at the Belle Point playground at a cost of \$10,000. Mr. Herling seconded.

Ms. Davis said that since the playground was within the Greenbelt Forest Preserve and installation of the pervious path was not a high cost, it was the action to take. Noting that the original project path was budgeted at \$3,000, she asked if the additional \$7,000 could be funded with Program Open Space funds. Mr. McLaughlin said staff would check.

Mr. Roberts expressed concern about the use of a pervious surface path. He mentioned that he was familiar with test patches of pervious surface materials that had not held up after the first few years. Mayor Jordan noted the pervious surface installed at Springhill Lake Recreation Center has held up well.

Mr. Putens suggested Council hold off further discussion on this item until the next meeting to give Council additional time to look at the site and consider the surface options. Ms. Davis requested staff provide Council with information on the conditions of the pervious surfaces previously installed at Buddy Attick Park and Springhill Lake Recreation Center.

Mr. Putens moved to table this item. Ms. Mach seconded. Motion passed 5-2. (Davis, Pope)

Ms. Pope stressed the need for some type of surface on the pathway as soon as possible since individuals with accessibility issues cannot access the playground.

MARYLAND MUNICIPAL LEAGUE 2016 LEGISLATIVE REQUESTS: Mayor Jordan read the agenda comments.

Ms. Mach suggested the legislative priority “Solar Energy Initiative/Funding for Electric Vehicles Infrastructure” submitted by the City to the Maryland Municipal League (MML) as a legislative priority in 2014 be resubmitted this year as a legislative priority.

There was discussion regarding protection of Highway User Revenue funds. Ms. Davis and Mr. Moran noted this is a standing legislative priority for MML.

Ms. Davis suggested Program Open Space be enhanced to assure municipalities receive their fair share of funds.

Ms. Mach moved that Council submit “Solar Energy Initiative” and “Protection of Program Open Space Funding” as legislative initiatives to the MML. Mr. Herling seconded. The motion passed 7-0.

Mr. Roberts moved that Council also submit “Municipal Authority for Approval of Pepco plans for Vegetative Management Around Utility Poles” as a legislative initiative to MML. Mr. Herling seconded.

Ms. Davis requested staff check with Delegate Tarlau to determine whether he will be resubmitting legislation in the next session regarding Pepco and the local protection of trees.

The motion passed 7-0.

Dear City Council:

We request that the City of Greenbelt erect its peace pole at the recently dedicated memorial site behind the library. Its presence in Greenbelt testifies to the creative and hardworking energies of its citizens to open up communication between Greenbelt and a city in the U.S.S.R during a time in the mid-1980's of intense propaganda, isolationism and the serious threat of nuclear war. The effort was organized by members of the Greenbelt Peace Committee, some of whom are honored in the memorial site.

Greenbelt acquired this peace pole on May 13, 1987 from the Japanese Peace Pole Project because of Greenbelt's persistent though unsuccessful effort to establish a "sister city" relationship with Rezekne, a city of similar size in Latvia, U.S.S.R.

The Greenbelt Peace Committee began its "sister city" initiative in February, 1984 by requesting a "sister city" similar to Greenbelt from The Ground Zero Pairing Project, a national anti-nuclear organization. Ground Zero had successfully created 60 other sister-city relationships between Soviet and U.S. cities. Greenbelt sent it first information packet to Rezekne and to the U.S.S.R.-USA Society, the official clearing house for sister cities, on March 21, 1984; it followed-up with a letter to the Soviet Embassy requesting support of this initiative.

The initial packet to Rezekne included greetings from the Greenbelt City Council inviting the people of Rezekne to become a "sister city." The packet also included letters from the City Recreation Department, Sierra Club, the Greenbelt Cultural Arts Center, Prince George's County Schools, Greenbelt Elementary School, St. Hugh's Catholic Church and Green Ridge House along with brochures, photographs and 150 personal messages from school children and Greenbelt residents.

The Greenbelt Peace Committee followed up with another packet on Thanksgiving, 1984, since it has not received an acknowledgement of its first mailing. Two years later, on March 27, 1986, a member of the Greenbelt Peace Committee, Gail Drake, met in Moscow with the Secretary for Relations between Soviet and Foreign Cities, inquiring what impeded Greenbelt's "sister city" initiative; she learned that Greenbelt was too small to be paired under the Soviet Union's sister cities program; further it considered Greenbelt a suburb, not a city.

Fiercer objections to this initiative were voiced locally by people who believed that the U.S.S.R. had to be condemned unconditionally because of its human rights violations. Others viewed a city in Latvia as unsuitable because of Soviet occupation of Latvia after World War II. Wide-spread media coverage of this initiative ensued when Arthur M. Eckstein, a resident of Greenbelt, stated in the *Washington Post* on June 15, 1986 that Rezekne was the site of a KGB prison. A political prison near Rezekne may well be the reason the U.S.S.R. vetoed the Greenbelt-Rezekne "sister-city" initiative. Greenbelt Mayor Gil Weidenfeld said: "It is not so easy to have a dialogue with communities that may have something to hide" (*Prince George's Journal*, June 17, 1986).

In the end, Greenbelt did not establish a sister-city relationship with any city in the Soviet Union. The peace pole, as an internationally recognized symbol, acts as a reminder of the importance of open communication between peoples of different ideologies and circumstances. We request that the City install the peace pole to remind us of the valiant effort by the City of Greenbelt and the Greenbelt Peace Committee to foster dialogue in an era of confrontation. We request that the pole be placed near the recently dedicated benches in honor of Bert Donn, Esther Webb, Bob Auerbach and Doug Love.

Petition to Delay Award

I petition City Council to delay or cancel the award for Contract No. 2015-01 Forest Preserve Health Assessment, Greenbelt Forest Preserve. I believe the following reasons apply:

1. The low number of responses to the Request for Proposal (RFP)
 - a. The City received only 5 proposals from 135 solicitations.
2. The solicitation targeted the wrong audience of experts.
 - a. As stated in the Forest Preserve Management and Maintenance Guidelines document a forest ecologist/biologist is the most appropriate type of professional to do a forest health assessment. The list of performers used by the City is from the Department of Natural Resource web site and emphasizes individuals and companies with a forester perspective.
3. The RFP was too stringently written thereby limiting the number of acceptable proposals.
 - a. For example, the RFP required candidates to be located in close proximity to the site.
4. The RFP should have been written to include a condition that the candidate will have knowledge and experience of non-chemical approaches to the management of invasive plants.
 - a. Greenbelt is moving in a direction of sustainability through various environmentally friendly initiatives therefore it is important that the RFP reflect this movement towards a sustainable community. Sustainability includes the use of non-toxic, non-chemical approaches. The Greenbelt forest preserve is protected by an ordinance and is meant to be left in an undisturbed state. There is no language in the ordinance that mandates a forest health assessment. The Management and Maintenance Guidelines suggests a forest evaluation would be helpful, but does not mandate such an evaluation. Also, the Management and Maintenance guidelines state clearly on page 56: "Economic benefits of resources derived from management activities are not considered relevant to the goal

of maintaining forest health and therefore should not be considered in designing a management strategy". A forester is a person trained in forestry. Forestry revolves around systematic forest management for the production of timber, conservation, etc. A forester has a bias toward silvicultural forest management. Silviculture is the art of cultivating a forest. A forester perspective involves economic gain and is not relevant to the Greenbelt Forest Preserve as written in the Management and Maintenance Guidelines.
