RE: ARPA – Progress to Date Summary

This memo presents an ARPA Progress to Date summary of activities, allocations and projects. Part 1 is an overview of the Council public participation process that occurred prior to and during the process of approving ARPA projects and programs. Part 2 of this memo covers the progress and accomplishments to date, of which there are many. This discussion covers the projects/programs that have been completed, those that are ongoing/underway with particular attention directed to the direct-benefit grant programs and their status. The final section discusses the remaining “uncommitted” funding and staff’s recommendations for allocation.

1. How did we get here?

In March of 2021 the federal government signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and following that announcement the City of Greenbelt was informed that we had been awarded \$22,880,000 in funding. Council felt from the onset that programming the ARPA funds needed resident input. To that end, the Council held a series of public meetings and work sessions, Regular meeting discussions, staff held focus groups, established a dedicated ARPA website, and solicited comments and input. ARPA updates and discussions also took place in each of the City Manager’s Quarterly Updates from mid-2021 forward. All told, the Council and staff held 29 meetings where the residents and businesses were invited to provide input into the allocation and expenditure process. These efforts are briefly described below.

- **Open Public Meetings.** The City held three open, in-person meetings over a two-week period. Those meetings, held in the Community Center, Greenbriar Common Room and Springhill Lake Rec Center were attended by 34 residents. The sessions elicited a lot of comments and recommendations.
 - **Focus Groups.** City staff held four focus groups (businesses, rental community, faith-based and food support and recognition groups) and received valuable input.
 - **EngageGreenbelt.org.** The EngageGreenbelt.org site was developed and very well attended with over 2,130 site visits in the 4 weeks alone. There were 110 comments/funding suggestions posted that were included in the funding decision deliberations.
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- **APRA Survey.** The ARPA survey was posted on the City website and was published in the Greenbelt News Review. We received a total of 287 surveys.
- **9 Council Work Sessions:** Feb 1, 2021, May 6, 2021, Aug 30, 2021, Dec 20, 2021, May 10, 2022, June 8 2022, Jun 18, 2022, Aug 29, 2022 and Sept 14, 2022.
- **13 Council Regular Meetings Agendas:** Sept 13, 2021, Jan 24, 2022, Apr 11, 2022, Jul 18, 2022, Aug 8, 2022, Sept 27, 2022, Jan 23, 2023, May 22, 2023, Sept 11, 2023, Sept 26, 2023, Oct 9, 2023, Oct 23, 2023, and Jan 22, 2024

2. What have we accomplished to date?

City staff has been actively working on ARPA since early 2021 identifying projects, engaging residents, businesses, and non-profits in order to recommend a slate of projects for Council and resident consideration to meet the (then) immediate need caused by the pandemic, to support our residents and businesses and to provide for updated facilities, vehicles, and other capital projects so we could continue to provide the residents the high-quality services and support they have come to expect. This section highlights the allocations and funding to date.

The table below shows the adjusted funding amounts for the major categories of Direct Benefits (grants) to Residents, Business Assistance, and Non-profit Food Assistance. The adjustment is the realistic estimate of staff on how much is projected to be expended based on past and current interest in the programs. As seen below, the Greenbelt City Council has allocated over 33% of the total ARPA funding received for direct benefit to our residents and businesses. The City has further allocated \$3.7M for parks, playgrounds, trails and other recreational projects that will directly benefit City residents and visitors. All told, this represents nearly 50% of the total ARPA allocation.

Direct Benefit Grant Programs. More specifically, Table 3 below presents the actual funds committed to an individual or entity through the various grant programs. “Funding committed” are those funds that have been programmed for a specific grant program/use and for which the City has awarded funds. In most of the entries in the table below, the funds have been disbursed fully and have been expended in the community. There are several grant programs where the funds have been awarded but staff is awaiting reimbursement requests or other documentation to process the payments. With that being said, all of the figures in the table below are expected to be expended in total.

Including the early emergency spending initiatives, the Council approved even before the full public engagement began, the City has completed projects accounting for just over \$10M, or 46%, of the City's total allocation.

The remaining projects are well underway and are targeted for completion before the December 2024 deadline. These 33 projects are a combination of direct benefit grant programs, capital projects, vehicle purchases and project/planning studies. Table 5 below presents these projects and programs. Several of the programs noted below will be discussed in the recommendations for the uncommitted funds.

3. Uncommitted Funding

The original allocation amount for many of the projects approved by the City Council in 2022 have changed as pricing, scopes and availability have changed. A significant change factor was “COVID inflation”, that is, many project costs have increased due to COVID supply chain issues, and even though those supply chain issues have largely been resolved, the “COVID pricing” remains. Another portion of uncommitted funding comes from the reallocation of funding from projects the City is not undertaking or programs where interest has waned. In total, there is approximately \$1.1M in uncommitted funding. Of that total, \$584.5K is restricted to ARPA-qualified projects and \$496.6K is within the Lost Revenue allocation that has fewer restrictions.

Staff has received comments and recommendations from several residents with suggestions on allocating this final tranche of funds. Below are staff recommendations for Council consideration. Note that the input from both Council members and the residents has been factored into the recommendations below.

Greenbelt People First

Greenbelt People First and ARPA

Greenbelt People First was organized in early 2022 as a coalition of leaders and members from a variety of local community and advocacy organizations to lobby for ARPA spending on “people, not projects.”

We advocated for programs that would directly benefit Greenbelt residents most in need from the Pandemic.

About a quarter of all ARPA funds -- around \$5.8 million -- was eventually allocated for emergency housing, utility, and food relief and to fund several innovative new grant programs to support residents recovering from the pandemic:

- Child Care Vouchers
- Educational Scholarships
- Health Care Vouchers
- First-Time Home Buyer Program
- Business Assistance programs

This is a summary of the \$1.1 million in allocations we propose and explain in the next slides.

- 1) Establish ARPA Outreach and Communications program to promote ARPA grant programs: **\$40,000.**

We believe there are structural problems that make it difficult for all Greenbelt neighbors to learn about and use available resources like the ARPA grants. Part of this issue is a connection or uptake problem with the grant applications that can be addressed by an extensive canvassing program and making the application process easier.

There are also structural issues in communications and challenges in reaching the 55% of Greenbelters who live in rental housing.

Proposal: ARPA Outreach and Communications

How to Better Serve Our Neighbors in Need

An outreach and communications program is critical to increasing grant applications, especially for our neighbors most in need.

Proposal: ARPA Outreach and Communications

Canvassing *Coordinated with non-profit contractor*

- **Door-to-door** canvassing neighbors in Franklin Park, Charlestowne North, and Mandan Village
- Location based canvassing at Safeway and Giant
- Flyers with QR codes linking to grant applications
- Outreach workers have scripts to explain grants

Proposal: ARPA Outreach and Communications

- Targeted **social media** marketing in 20770 to advertise the availability of ARPA funds
- **Website** recommendations (Greenbeltmd.gov)
 - Open all grant applications, update deadlines
 - Review and simplify the application process
 - Create a video walkthrough of the application process
 - Phone number/email for support from city worker

Proposal: ARPA Outreach and Communications

Canvassing

- **Phase I:** Establish canvassing and communications best practices in Greenbelt (4-6 weeks)
- **Phase II:** Additional 4-6 months until target neighborhoods are fully canvassed or until ARPA moneys are exhausted.

Outreach and Communications beyond ARPA

Additional goals

- Establish long-term communication networks to increase civic and economic engagement
- **Recruit residents** for advisory committee to formulate plans for better outreach and communications within Greenbelt
- **Register Voters**

Proposal: ARPA Outreach and Communications

Contractors

Two options are being considered for staffing: Selecting a Coordinator and hiring local residents as canvassers and/or contracting with an experienced canvassing organization for some parts of the work.

Budget: \$40,000; see proposal, appendix B.

2) Restore funding to original levels for these four “People First” programs. They were cut by **\$325,000** at the October 9 Council Meeting:

3) Give CCI Health Services **\$200,000** more for Health Care Vouchers. The CCI Health Care Voucher program was the most successful of the ARPA People First programs, expending \$400,000 within 6 months, helping about 900 residents with health care needs.

4) Increase food gift card payments by **\$75,000** to Restoration Church and St. Hugh Food Pantry through the end of 2024. St. Hugh currently gets \$5,000 per month; Restoration Center got \$10,000 in two installments. Increase funding by \$5,000 per month for St. Hugh Food Pantry for 10 months and by \$2500 per month for 10 months for Restoration Center.

5) Increase microgrant spending by **\$50,000**. The microgrant program has the potential to be an important tool for expanding community engagement through identifying grassroots leaders throughout Greenbelt to organize community building and development activities.

6) Approve additional rental assistance for **\$300,000**. Liz Park indicated she could distribute the money if the Council approved it. Treasury gave ARPA jurisdictions funding for a three-year window to fund recovery from the pandemic.

7) Increase funding for 5 more applicants for first-time GHI purchasers -- **\$75,000**. Funding for the mortgage assistance program was cut in half, by \$250,000 on October 9.
